Our Member Libraries

New Glarus Public Library

Big things are happening in New Glarus. Having received the \$4.25M federal grant for a new building, they are full steam ahead. They have already identified the location of the new library and have hired OPN Architects out of Madison to design their library. For now, they continue to offer some great programming, such as a Dungeons & Dragons Club for middle school aged children and Read with Ripley for kids. Ripley is a therapy dog who likes to attend story times.

Mount Horeb Public Library

Mount Horeb Public Library is a valuable asset to the community. Their materials checkouts has continue to rise each year since the pandemic. They sheltered 600 children from the school during an emergency evacuation—an unsettling but important role the library played during that crisis. They continue to work toward improvements at the library, including wage increases and facility repairs.

Lakeview Library, a Madison Public Library Branch

The community loves Lakeview Library. A patron recently (when the weather was a bit warmer!) showed up and washed all of the library's windows on their own initiative, which was a well-received donation of the person's time and resources. The library struggles with storage space and are trying to figure out a way to continue with their Friends of the Library book sales without having to store a lot of books.
