Systems Administration

- Office 2016 reaches its end-of-life in October 2025. SCLS has purchased Office 2024 Pro Plus.
 We will be upgrading Office on patron and staff PCs. Details will be posted on the information will be posted to the Technology News blog when they have been ironed out.
- Windows 11 24H2 Feature Update has been released. We will be upgrading all Windows 11 PCs soon.
- Windows Server 2025 has been released. SCLS will ask for a quote so that we can upgrade our servers which are all on Server 2019.

Microsoft 365

SCLS staff continues to work with libraries on the rollout – of the 45 libraries participating in SCLS-hosted email, 41 are live with the new settings and 4 libraries remain. We hope to have this project wrapped up by the end of December.

E-Rate

We are beginning to prepare for the application process for the 2025/2026 E-rate cycle. Informational sessions are being held on <u>December 5</u> and <u>December 10</u>.

Amherst Live on SCLS Technology Services

The Lettie W. Jensen Library of Amherst is now live on SCLS Technology Services. This project is funded by an LSTA grant. Emily and Nick visited the library on 10/25 to install the Network equipment, staff PCs, patron PCs, and wireless access point. Emily will be going back out on January 2nd for their ILS go live date to help with technology issues and remove their old equipment as well.

Data Services

New and updated data dashboards:

- <u>Library Statistics Summary</u> This dashboard visualizes data from the monthly report of <u>the same</u> <u>name</u>. I created the dashboard after hearing from multiple library Directors that they regularly included either the report or portions of the data it contains in the information packets they provide to their library board. The dashboard presents the data in a format ready to download or print, which I hope will make it a reliable and easy-to-use resource for member libraries.
- Per Capita Service Measure Comparison I created this dashboard using data from the
 Department of Public Instruction Annual Reports since 2019. The dashboard's purpose is to
 enable staff to compare their library to other libraries in the state, library system, locale
 category, population group, and county on selected service data measures. All the metrics
 shown in the dashboard are calculated either per capita or per 1,000 residents to allow easier
 comparison between libraries of different sizes. Reference lines in each chart show the median

value of the metric for each grouping to give a sense of where a selected library ranks in comparison to the group overall.
