Middleton Public Library

Middleton is proud to announce the addition of a bookmobile service! This is a full service library on wheels that supports the library's existing outreach services. The bookmobile will be deployed every month for events in the community, such as the Good Neighbor festival. It even has an ADA-accessible lift. Congratulation to Middleton Public on this amazing new service.

Dane County Library Service

DCLS had their fair share of vehicle issues in 2024, which has only made them busier. They had to consider how they provide service, including making many on-the-fly decisions, while the bookmobile was out of commission. And, because they've had to communicate changes to their services, they have gotten a better sense of how to reach their patrons – they have started a newsletter to update the community, which a lot of their patrons have signed up to receive. The director of DCLS reports that this experience has reaffirmed that meeting patrons in their community is a service that their patrons really value and appreciate.

La Valle Public Library

When the library director learned that there would not be additional funding to the library in the 2024 budget, she and her staff started an Amazon Wish List so that patrons could purchase staff-selected items for the library to show their support. By the end of June, the people had purchased over 110 books for the library. These donations can come from all over the country, from those who called La Valle home at one point and have now moved on to other places. La Valle Public has found several ways to creatively generate revenue through donations and grants.
